Special thanks to the ten people who made it to the draft in person. Your ability to go the extra mile (literally) not only helped expedite the draft, but also made it that much more enjoyable. I really think the fact that so many of us were there in person and were able to meet will only make this league stronger.

TEAM SKETCHES

Now that the draft is over and the season is about to begin, I thought I'd take a little text space up and do a quick overview of each team and how they shape up for this year, as well as down the road. Any comments made by me are in no way intended to offend or upset anyone. However, if I do upset anyone, please feel free to register any complaints you may have with Colby Wright. He'll be happy to deal with you.

NL CENTRAL

Blind Lemons: Although they dealt away the #1 pick and the rights to Griffey, the deal enabled the Lems to snare Alou at #8 and O'Neill in the 2nd round. The Lemons then came back and took Saberhagen and Alvarez with their next two picks. Pat Rapp and Scott Sanders give the Lems two more nice young arms, and the two Mike's, Kingery and Stanley, add to their offense.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Joe Oliver--34th round. Could compete for the Lem's starting catching job in '96.

Bloomington: Solid draft for the future. Three young guns in the rotation are Hentgen, Trachsel, and Karsay. "Comeback" could be the key word for the Bees. If McGwire, Robby Thompson, and Gant return to their past form, they will team with Piazza, Hamelin, Ventura, and Sierra to form a scary offense.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Ray Durham--will be a stud at 2B.

Charlevoix: Solid infield with Palmeiro, Kent, Dunston, and E. Martinez. Joe Carter and Brett Butler provide some sock in the outfield. "CY" Maddux and PJ Martinez are a scary 1-2 punch in the rotation. Swift and Dave West round out a tough rotation. Cutters will compete for World Series birth.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Doc Gooden-29th round. IF he gets his act together, could be a productive pitcher for 5-6 more years.

East Indy: May contend for division crown. Larkin, Bonilla, and Kevin Mitchell provide a scary threesome. Cone, Ashby, and Zane Smith are solid in the rotation. Mitchell's defection overseas will harm the Tiggers in '96.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Bonilla--5th round. I'm sorry, but a guy with his track record for run production shouldn't have slipped this far down. Just my opinion.

NL EAST

Long Island: Two of the best first basemen in baseball reside in Long Island. Frank Thomas and John Olerud look to battle it out for the batting title for years to come. Appier and Smoltz head the Tiger rotation. Tigers have some great outfield prospects as well. (Rivera, Trot Nixon, and Karim Garcia) STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Deshields--end of 4th round.---he's still only a pup.

Racine: After tabbing Kenny Lofton in first round, the Heat came back with 2 studs, Mussina and Bere, with next two picks. Youngsters Clayton, Al Martin, and Jose Oliva promise a nice future for Racine.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Antonio Osuna---round 33. He could be amoung the leaders in saves in all BRASSBALL in '96.

Secaucus: GREAT starting rotation! Clemens, Key, Danny Jackson, Darling, and Van Landingham. With Canseco and Caminiti leading the offense, the Travelers will be tough. May be a slugger away from World Series.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Van Landingham--12th round. Could develop into staff ace.

Wauwatosa: Anyone need a lefty? The Wizards have cornered the market on southpaws, with Avery, Fassero, Langston, Sid Fernandez, Howe, and Randy Myers. Whiten, Biggio, Will Clark, and Scott Cooper give the W's a very tough offense.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Todd Walker--13th round. Hitting MACHINE! Only question is, at what position?

NL WEST

Emerald City: First two picks used on all-star middle infield of Cordero and Knoblauch. Throw in Grace, Puckett, and Derek Bell and the Cyclones should score some runs. May have to wait a year or two while young pitchers Brian Anderson, Sterling Hitchcock, and Andrew Lorraine develop. When they do, they'll team up with two good ones in Gordon and Bobby Jones.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Ben Grieve--14th round. He may not arrive until '98, but how can so many people be wrong?

Nashville: Need Pitching? Look at this squad! Randy Johnson, Jose Rijo, and Alex Fernandez?! SMOKE! Add in phenoms Alan Benes and John Wasdin and this team could win the E.R.A. title for years. A bullpen with Beck, Carrasco, and Lee Smith cant be all bad either. (except maybe this year) STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Jose Offerman--19th round. Will start at SS for the Assassins in '96.

Nome Gnomes: In two years, may have the best outfield in all BRASSBALL. Manny Ramirez, Brian L. Hunter, and Reggie Sanders are all potential impact players. Team them with Fryman and Ivan Rodriguez and the future looks good.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: G. Pena--15th round. I know, he has been a disappointment thus far. But if he ever gets his act together, he could be well worth it.

Tolar Rattlers: Went with some solid, experienced veterans. Gwynn, Molitor, Boggs, (how many batting titles is that?) and Ripken will provide excellent leadership for the younger Rattlers. Should compete for division in '95, and has 33.5 million in the bank. WOW!

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Todd Jones---Future closer.

A.L. CENTRAL

Cook County Maulers: Present looks bleak, but Maulers may rise soon. Youngsters Cliff Floyd and Carlos Delgado are key. If they develop as expected, and team with Juan Gonzalez, Sheffield, Palmer, and Gates, offense could be frightening. Pitching staff needs work.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Bryan Harvey and Duane Ward-17th and 18th rounds. If they come back from injuries, look for some heat out of the Mauler pen in '96.

Arlington Thoroughbreds: Among the best teams in all BRASSBALL. Good 3 starters in Bones, Me. Perez, and Bobby Munoz. Great offense with Salmon, Matt Williams, Lankford, Klesko, and Jimmy Leyritz. Should lead the A.L. in homers. May be a starter away from a World Series trip.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Todd Hollandsworth--29th round--Next Dodger rookie of year?

Richmond Madhatters: Will battle for division with Arlington and Box City. Best pitching in division. (Drabek, J.Hamilton, Sh.Reynolds, Jim Bullinger) Daulton, Chili Davis, and Roberto Alomar give Richmond a nice offense as well.

STEAL OF DRAFT: Josias Manzanillo--15th round--He may turn out to be a bust. I just like saying his name. J-O-S-I-A-S M-A-N-Z-A-N-I-L-L-O!!!

Box City Parcelmen: Best outfield in all BRASSBALL? Could be, with Bonds, Dykstra, and Buhner. Ken Ryan and Roberto Hernandez form great bullpen tandem. Ken Hill is a gem! May need to upgrade other starters to win this year.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Kile--8th round. If he returns to form.

A.L.EAST

Florida Aces: GREAT offense. Bagwell, Galarraga, Boone, Mack, Rickey Henderson, and Jefferies. Whew! But the Aces may need all of that and more. The starting rotation, with Morris, Stewart, and Mike Moore is a little past its prime. But help is on the way! Billy Wagner, Doug Million, Ho Park, Jose Silva, amd A. Benitez are all top prospects. STEAL: Benitez--16th round--future all-star closer.

A.L. EAST (cont)

Hessville Evereadys: Early picks built a great outfield in Sosa, Walker, and Bernie Williams. Hal Morris and Ozzie Guillen solid at 1B and SS. With Black Jack McDowell, Smiley, and David Wells hurling, the Evereadys will compete in this division.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Tim Laker--round 32. May be starting at catcher in '96.

Minnesota Mudcats: The only rival to Nashville's stable of quality arms. Benes, Ben McDonald, and Astacio form a fearsome foursome. If prospects Roper, Latroy Hawkins, and Jaret Wright develop-OUCH!! Team could be awesome by '97 if Charles Johnson and Alex Rodriguez develop to join Tino Martinez, Carlos Garcia, and Todd Zeile.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Zeile--8th round? Why?

St. Lucie Snook: Speaking of guys slipping, how bout Albert Belle to pick #9. This guy flirted with the triple crown last year. I'm sure "Kirkwood" didn't mind. The Snook sport a nice veteran rotation with Dennis Martinez, Glavine, Kevin Gross, and Mark Portugal. Three great outfield prospects as well--Abreu, VI. Guerrero, and D. Erstad.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Erstad--round 30. Talk to me in three or four years.

A.L. WEST

Poway Posse: Baerga, Bichette, Grissom, Mattingly, and Luis Gonzalez. These guys can hit! But do they have the pitching? Nied, Mahomes, Swindell, and Kenny Rogers need to improve for the Posse to improve.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Pokey Reese--29th round. May be starting at SS for the Posse by '97.

Santa Barbara Outlaws: Mondesi, Hoiles, and the Vaughn Brothers (Greg and Mo) should light up the Outlaw scoreboard. Fans may have to wait for young pitchers VanPoppel, Gomes, and S. Soderstrom to develop.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Kevin Tapani--10th round. What happened to this guy? Outlaws hope he returns to form of the early 90's.

Santa Monica Sharks: Trading up to get Griffey may set back the Sharks a year or so, but after that, look out! Youngsters Thome, Jeter, JR Phillips, along with a large bank account and some recently acquired draft picks will accelerate the team's development.

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Curt Schilling and Tommy Greene--8th and 9th rounds. Could be #1 & 2 starters in Shark rotation next year!

SoCal Golden Knights: Championship contender! McGriff, Sandy Alomar, Justice, Wallach, Steve Finley, and Jay Bell form a great nucleus. The rotation is solid with Ramon Martinez, Nagy, and Freeman. Needs one more starter. (who doesn't?)

STEAL OF THE DRAFT: Rickert Frickert. (Faneyte) Those who attended the draft need no explanation.

DEADLINES

Everyone should, once again, read over your constitution so you are clear on how we are doing things. Especially crucial is the league deadline listing on pages 28-29. Please make a special note of these. Upcoming **postmark** deadlines include:

- -March 20: Pitching rotation for April games do out to Commish. (ME)
- -March 20: Road instructions due out to April opponents.
- -April 15: Series report form due out to your league reporter.
- -April 15: series result mailings due to your April home opponents.
- -April 25: Team leaders form (through all April games) due to your statistician.

**Special note: Please do not wait til the last minute on league deadlines. The newsletter will get out that much quicker if everyone gets results out quickly. It also will make things easier on the reporters, statisticians, and yours truly. Thanks.

I would like to thank all the individuals who put in all the extra time and effort necessary to make the draft run smoothly and quickly. All the managers in the league appreciate it.

The West Coast Draft Headquarters Saturday, February 18, 1995 had all four managers from the American eague Western Division in one room. The managers are Scott Campbell, Brian Budzyn, Bruce Julin and Mike O'Connor. Managers in our division had picks 8, 16, 21 and 23. The day started greatly. At 7 o'clock. Kevin called to confirm the first pick in the draft was Griffey. I had obtained the first overall pick in the draft in a trade. Brian had the first player stolen from him in the draft at the beginning of the second round. He selected Mo Vaughn with the 23rd pick. He was asked for his next selection because he was to pick 26th. which was only two players away, and the next manager had two consecutive picks. Wil Cordero was his selection. The phone rang a couple of minutes later and we all assumed it was for Bruce, but no it was for Brian. Allen Nelson had taken Wil Cordero with one of his two selections. After Scott Campbell selected 33rd we had to wait until the third round before our group had another selection. I had traded my second round pick in the deal for the first pick in the draft. I said I would draft Pedro Martinez with my pick in the third round. Allen Telgenhof stole him with the pick before mine. We were beginning to wonder if our draft headquarters had been bugged by the Allen's. (Allen Nelson and Allen Telgenhof). We sailed along into the fourth round. After Scott made his selection in the fourth round the other managers asked me which players I was considering for my next picks. I was going to have two picks before another manager in our draft headquarters would have a selection. DeSheilds and a starting pitcher, hopefully, Sele were the players under consideration. The update from Chicago came in and 5 of the next 7 selections were starting pitchers, including Sele. I decided to take a starting pitcher and hope DeSheilds would fall to my next selection. Ramon Martinez was selected. I was going to take DeSheilds or Trachsel with my next selection. Both were taken with selections before my pick. We went though to Scott's selection in the sixth round without any problems. I again had two picks in a row. I said my first selection would be Melido Perez and I was not sure who my second selection would be. This time three picks before my selection Colby Wright took Melido Perez. We now knew it was not the Allen's who had bugged our draft headquarters. The other managers told me it was the curse of Griffey. I decided ot to say whom my next pick was going to be. Rickey Henderson was still available for me to select. After Scott made his selection in the 8th round I decided to tempt fate again. I said it was time to take that pitching card of Ontiveros. Tom Johnson took him two selections before mine. Tired of having my carded players taken, I decided it was time to take two amateur players with my next selections. Derek Jeter and Ruben Rivera were the players being considered. I took Jeter and before my next pick Rivera was taken by Tom Taormina. My fall back pick was Bill Swift. He was taken one pick before me by Allen Telgenhof. The bugged draft headquarters theory sprang to life again. I pulled out my cards and began to look at Marvin Freeman's card. Before I even got a chance to look at it, Scott Campbell drafted him. I started looking for a camera over my shoulder. I decided to settle for Mark Portugal. This time Charles Kirkwood took my player one pick before me. I decided to take Willie Banks with my next selection. He made it to my pick. Bruce was upset, however, because his next selection was going to be Willie Banks. Brain had Allen Nelson steal another player from him between the 14th and 15th round. Brian made the selection of Hudek. The phone rang. It was for Brain and not Bruce. Hudek had been selected. Brian needed to make another selection. I sailed along happily into the 14th round. The player being considered was Roger Cedeno, but I decided to wait until the pick I had at the beginning of the 15th round, which I had obtained in the trade for the first pick in the draft, and take some needed innings. Greg Swindell was selected. The last pick in the 14th round, taken by Doug Kehlmeier, who I had made the trade with, was Roger Cedeno. West Coast Draft Headquarters burst out laughing. The curse of Griffey was alive and well. I was ready to scream. It seemed I was one round behind all day in trying to obtain the players I wanted. A tribute to the good managers in this league or none of us know what we are doing. We will all find out soon enough.

Hopefully a good time was had by all in this dispersal draft. Now it is time to analyze our teams, begin trading of fill our holes and improve the team and play the games. See you at Santa Monica Stadium. The balls will be jumping out of the park with my pitching staff.
